Compliance guidelines for all adult Volunteers

For the safety of our children and vulnerable adults, the Parish of Blessed Virgin Mary, Queen of Peace and St. Veronica requires that all adult volunteers are to have background checks and take the required training sessions. The State of Pennsylvania and the Diocese of Scranton have made it mandatory for anyone who, in the course of their responsibilities, comes in contact with children be mandated for all background checks and sessions. Father Beck has decided that every adult volunteer be mandated to do this because 'Aren't we all morally mandated to be reporters?'

Baptisms

Parents wishing to have their child baptized into the Catholic faith should contact the Rectory at least 3 months before the child is born to make the necessary arrangements. Participation in a parish Baptismal Preparation Program is required. Both Godparents need to be Christian. One of those need to be a practicing Catholic. By being a practicing Catholic, means attending a Catholic Church regularly. Adults who wish to be baptized need to enter the RCIA program with Deacon Matt Lorent.

Weddings

Couples planning to be married in our parish must contact a priest at least one year in advance. It is strongly urged that this be done prior to making any other arrangements. Every couple is required to participate in a Diocesan Marriage Preparation Program (Pre-Cana) which serves as an enhancement of their preparation to receive the sacrament. You need to be registered with a parish to be married at Blessed Virgin Mary Queen of Peace.

The RCIA program begins in September and continues until Easter. It entails regular classroom sessions in which the participants are instructed about our faith. The program also requires them to gather following Mass in order to discuss the readings or address questions about the Mass itself. Tuesday Morning Quilters

Our Tuesday Morning Quilter's group is a gathering of faith and fellowship. Each Tuesday the team assembles downstairs in the church to layout the fabrics that will be used for the day. We are looking for volunteers to join us – no sewing experience is necessary – we are happy to teach those that are willing to help. We sew blankets and fabric pieces to create sleeping bags which are then donated to a shelter in Scranton. Inside each sleeping bag we include a shirt and pants; a quart size Ziploc bag with travel sized toiletries to include a toothbrush, toothpaste, soap, shampoo, lotion and a comb. Our goal is to produce (4) bags each Tuesday. Our ministry was started 19 years ago and we have produced over 3556 sleeping bags since!

Some of us start as early as 7:00am – but all are welcome to start at any time they can. We normally begin to leave between 10:00am and 11:00am. You are flexible to help out as little or as much as your schedule allows.

We also knit and crochet hats and scarves that are included in the sleeping bags during the winter. We also donate hats, scarves and blankets to St. Joseph's Center in Scranton, Pa.

We are always seeking donations of items to go into the toiletry bags, quart sized Ziploc bags, sheets, comforters, pieces of fabric to make the bags; men's ties to create the straps for the sleeping bag; fresh new socks, tee shirts, sweatpants to include with the bag. Please leave items in the Church basement. As soon as you enter the basement, our storage room door is on the right, you may leave items there for us to use on Tuesday mornings.

Liturgy /Worship

All People The Worshiping Assembly at Mass

In the celebration of Mass the faithful are a holy people, a chosen people, a royal priesthood: they give thanks to God and offer the Victim not only through the hands of the priest but also together with him and learn to offer themselves. They should endeavor to make this clear by their deep sense of reverence for God and their charity toward brothers and sisters who share with them in the celebration (no. 95). They should become one body, whether by hearing the word of God, or joining in prayers and liturgical song, or above all by offering the sacrifice together and sharing together in the Lord's table (no. 96).

Because the whole liturgy is a corporate act of the gathered assembly (GIRM no. 34; Catechism of the Catholic Church no. 1144), there are certain parts of the Mass that are to be done by the whole assembly, the congregation of the faithful and all the ministers, in order to express the corporate nature of this act. Through these actions, the entire congregation of the faithful joins itself to Christ in acknowledging the great things that God has done and in offering the sacrifice (no. 78).

Based upon Roman Missal Formational Materials provided by the Secretariat for the Liturgy of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, 2010

In the Church's liturgy the divine blessing is fully revealed and communicated. The Father is acknowledged and adored as the source and the end of all the blessings of creation and salvation. In his Word who became incarnate, died, and rose for us, he fills us with his blessings. Through his Word, he pours into our hearts the Gift that contains all gifts, the Holy Spirit.

CCC 1082

For the purpose of assisting the work of the common priesthood of the faithful, other *particular ministries* also exist, not consecrated by the sacrament of Holy Orders; their functions are determined by the bishops, in accord with liturgical traditions and pastoral needs. "Servers, readers, commentators, and members of the choir also exercise a genuine liturgical function.

CCC 1143

In the celebration of the sacraments it is thus the whole assembly that is *leitourgos*, each according to his function, but in the "unity of the Spirit" who acts in all. "In liturgical celebrations each person, minister or layman, who has an office to perform, should carry out *all* and *only* those parts which pertain to his office by the nature of the rite and the norms of the liturgy."

All life is Precious. To Respect Life, means to respect all Life.

Faith involves both the head and the heart. Catholic devotions and traditions enliven and nurture our Catholic faith, touching our hearts and allowing us to express our love of God.

Devotions/ Prayer

Prayer is a vital necessity. Proof from the contrary is no less convincing: if we do not allow the Spirit to lead us, we fall back into the slavery of sin. How can the Holy Spirit be our life if our heart is far from him?

Nothing is equal to prayer; for what is impossible it makes possible, what is difficult, easy. . . . For it is impossible, utterly impossible, for the man who prays eagerly and invokes God ceaselessly ever to sin.

Those who pray are certainly saved; those who do not pray are certainly damned.

CCC 2744

Prayer and *Christian life* are *inseparable*, for they concern the same love and the same renunciation, proceeding from love; the same filial and loving conformity with the Father's plan of love; the same transforming union in the Holy Spirit who conforms us more and more to Christ Jesus; the same love for all men, the love with which Jesus has loved us. "Whatever you ask the Father in my name, he [will] give it to you. This I command you, to love one another."

He "prays without ceasing" who unites prayer to works and good works to prayer. Only in this way can we consider as realizable the principle of praying without ceasing.

First Saturday Marian Devotions

Then the Blessed Mother spoke to Lucia, and she promised "to assist at the hour of death, with the graces necessary for salvation, all those who, on the first Saturday of five consecutive moths, shall confess [their sins], receive holy Communion, recite five decades of the Rosary, and keep me company for fifteen minutes while meditating on the fifteen mysteries of the Rosary, with the intention of making reparation to me".

We meet every First Saturday of the every month, after the 9:00 am Liturgy of the Word with Communion. We would love to see you there.

It is pleasant to spend time with Christ, to lie close to His breast like the beloved Disciple and to feel the infinite love present in His heart." [St. John Paul II]. You can speak to Jesus, aware that you are in His Presence and tell Him what is in your mind. Listen for His Response. St. Louis de Montfort used to stop into Church often, sometimes before and after school, and say a prayer before the Blessed Sacrament [he was a French Roman Catholic Priest and Confessor]. It is good to spend time, an hour, in the Lord's Presence. He waits for us patiently to visit Him. Jesus says: "Come to Me all you who labor and are burdened and I will give you rest." The Altar & Rosary Society

The Rosary Altar Society was founded in the fifteenth century by Alan del la Roche, a Dominican Friar. On October 2, 1898, Pope Leo XIII issued the apostolic constitution on the Most Holy Rosary (Ubi primum) containing the laws, rights, and privileges of the Confraternity. It states that the Confraternity was instituted so that the faithful, united in fraternal charity by the prayer of the Rosary, may praise and honor the Blessed Virgin and secure her patronage. The Rosary Confraternity has spread throughout the Catholic world, including the United States, where it exists in many parishes under the title of Rosary Altar Society. Although men and children may be enrolled and enjoy all the rights and privileges of the Confraternity, in the United States the parish Rosary Altar Society restricts its membership to women. Since the time of Alan del la Roche, the Confraternity has been the primary means of propagating devotion to the Rosary, and has raised the Rosary from a form of private prayer to that of shared or common prayer. "For whenever a person fulfills the obligation of reciting the rosary according to the rule of the Confraternity, he includes in his intentions all its members, and they in turn render him the same service many times over" (Ubi primum)

The primary purpose of the society is to praise and honor the Blessed Virgin Mary and to secure her patronage by the recitation of the Rosary for the mutual spiritual benefit of all its members throughout the world, and to promote and aid the parish spiritually by performing activities for the care and well being of the Church, as well as cultivating camaraderie within our Parish Family and Community. At Blessed Virgin Mary, Queen of Peace and St. Veronica's Parish every registered active member of our parish is eligible for membership by returning the Altar & Rosary Society annual dues envelope .

We look forward to seeing you and planning activities and "fun" fundraisers for the coming year. Regular monthly meetings are scheduled on the second Sunday of each month after the last Mass in the morning in the Parish Hall.
